
Unama'ki – Cape Breton Economic Development Realities

People: Cape Breton's Growth Imperative

After decades of decline, Unama'ki – Cape Breton now has a growing population. The Dept. of Labour Skills and Immigration (LSI) reports that in 2022, there were over 800 Permanent Residents attracted to Cape Breton, up from 660 in the previous year. This is the right trajectory, but we need to do more.

In the 2021 Census, there were 2565 non-permanent residents in Northeastern Nova Scotia (635 in the federal riding of Cape Breton-Canso and 1,930 in Sydney-Victoria), which includes the large number of international students. There is a large population of international students available to the Cape Breton workforce, creating opportunity for employers to fill labour gaps. According to OneNS, only 7% of these students stay in Nova Scotia. This is a missed opportunity for retention in the area.

To ensure a growing workforce to overcome demographic challenges and growing industries, Cape Breton's population needs to grow intentionally, and aggressively. The goal of the CB REN is to help the region achieve annual population growth of 1.2% and annual workforce growth of 0.5%. A growth rate of this pace will result in a combined population of Inverness, Victoria and Richmond Counties of 42,147 by 2040, and a workforce of 14,023 by 2040 (translating to a population of 53,503, and a workforce size of 15,494 by 2060.

Nova Scotia: 2 Million by 2060

In late 2021, the Province of Nova Scotia committed to an overall strategy to double the current population to two million people by 2060 adding an average of 25,000 more people to Nova Scotia each year.

Efforts to date of the CB REN, members



of the Cape Breton Local Immigration Partnership, and many programs of the Cape Breton Partnership strongly align with this strategy.







Climate Change

On September 24th, Hurricane Fiona struck Nova Scotia with sustained winds of 155km/h. It became the costliest weather event in Atlantic Canadian history. Though the storm tracked directly across CB REN member communities, its impact was most severely felt on either side of the region in Pictou and CBRM. The next storm however, may have equally devastating effects on communities in southern and northern Unama'ki – Cape Breton.

Climate change is also affecting our harbours, key industries such as fishing and fish processing in particular, and industry and government efforts to transition to green energy development such as offshore wind hydrogen and ammonia development and production opportunities.

Green Energy

On September 10th, 2022 with the Strait of Canso Offshore Wind Task Force in attendance, the Province of Nova Scotia sent a target to offer leases for five gigawatts of offshore wind energy by 2030 to support its budding green hydrogen industry. In the Strait of Canso, the first two permitted Hydrogen producers, Everwind and Bearhead, join efforts from established companies like Port Hawkesbury Paper to secure green and reliable energy sources.

In addition, efforts continue for the greening of buildings, transportation, and the larger grid across Nova Scotia and the continent.










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

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In 2022/23, the community of Eskasoni led by Eskasoni Band Council had many success stories.

The CB REN works most closely with Eskasoni Corporate Division, led by General Manager Steve Parsons and Business Development Manager Alyssia Jeddore, who also sits on the board of the CB REN.

The following projects are just two examples of the many exciting initiatives underway in Eskasoni.

• Last year the construction continued at the Kiknu Long-term Care Home in Eskasoni. When complete this long-term care home will be the first licensed nursing home in a First Nations community and will house up to 48

This new home for elders will offer holistic health care and services that reflect First Nations culture, values and attitudes. It allows residents to live comfortably and with dignity. The facility is slated to open in 2024.



• An infrastructure project valued at \$4.8 million will help Unama'ki - Cape Breton's five Indigenous communities collect and preserve traditional Mi'kmaw knowledge.

The building will be constructed along Crane Cove in Eskasoni and will house both the Unama'ki Institute of Natural Resources and the Mi'kmag Environmental Learning Centre.

We'kogma'g First Nation is a growing and successful community located on the shores of the Pitu'pog / Bras D'or Lake. We'kogma'g is known for its modern commercial properties including a Tim Horton's on highway 105, and the continued success of WFN fisheries, which operates steelhead trout facilties in multiple locations in Nova Scotia.

In 2022, the good news continued with a new moderate livelihood fishery, and new community signage to the benefit of both We'kogma'g community members and travelers on highway 105.

We'koqma'q gets federal approval for moderate livelihood fishery

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


Wagmatcook First Nation is located along the shores of the Pitu'poq / Bras D'or Lake and is known for its beauty.

Two major announcements in 2022 related to active transportation and conservation reflect both the values and the opportunities in Wagmatcook.

The Mary Harper Nature Reserve, which was one of the Bras d'Or Preservation Nature Trust properties, was transferred to Wagmatcook First Nation and Sespite'tmnej Kmitkinu Conservancy at a Mawiomi (gathering) in the community on October 5, 2022.

 Originally Wagmatcook land before colonization, the 60-acre parcel has 1.8 km of shoreline and vegetation important to Mi'kmag culture and medicines such as black ash, sweet grass and



The community of Wagmatcook received funding through the Connect2 program, an initiative that encourages active transportation in communities.

Wagamatcook First Nation, which is divided by the Trans-Canada Highway, will use its Connect2 funding to complete a feasibility report on two projects: a highway passageway and a multi-use trail design and all-terrain vehicle prioritization plan. The consultant will assess how the projects could help people move

May 2023 Economic Update for **Atlantic Canada**

The Atlantic Canadian economy is off to a good start in 2023 thanks to population and employment gains. However, economic growth in the Maritime provinces is expected to be lower than in 2023 due to high interest rates and inflation, according to APEC's Spring ATLANTIC Economic Update.

The Maritimes' population growth outpaced Canada year-over-year up to January 1, 2023. Newfoundland and Labrador's population grew the fastest in 50 years. Housing starts across the region fell year-over-year in the first quarter of 2023. Elevated interest rates are reducing housing market activity. Labour shortages are easing while employment is expanding.

NS International Goods Exports, March 2023

Thomas Storring, Director – Economics and Statistics: The US is by far Nova Scotia's largest destination for international goods exports. For the January-March 2023 period, Nova Scotia exports to the United States were up 5.6% to \$1,046.2 million.

China is Nova Scotia's second largest export destination and exports increased 41.8% to \$284.5 million in the first three months of 2023.

The fastest growth was in relatively small export destinations of Indonesia, Switzerland, and Brazil. Year to date, the largest declines in exports were in Mexico, South Korea, and Netherlands.

Atlantic Canadians have always taken care of each other. Conditions, from the weather to the economy, have made us resilient and entrepreneurial, shapers of our own destiny.

It is apparent to us as former leaders in the region that a new day is dawning. Our focus on education is reaping dividends. 

Inflation is cooling faster in the Atlantic provinces


Change in consumer price index, year-to-date in March 2023 (%)



Highest wage growth is in Atlantic Canada and Manitoba Change in average weekly wages, year-to-date in February 2023 (%)






