Regional Enterprise Networks

The Cape Breton Partnership provides economic development support to four First Nations communities and is the primary economic development service provider for all five municipalities across the Island under the Regional Enterprise Network (REN) model in partnership with the Province of Nova Scotia.

As part of this model, the Cape Breton Partnership administers two RENs: the Cape Breton Regional Enterprise Network (CB REN), and the Cape Breton Regional Municipality Regional Enterprise Network (CBRM REN). Both RENs are part of a network of seven RENs across the province of Nova Scotia.





The CB REN includes the First Nation Communities of Eskasoni, Membertou, Wagmatcook, and We'koqma'q; the Municipalities of the Counties of Inverness, Richmond, and Victoria; and the Town of Port Hawkesbury.

The CBRM REN is represented by the Cape Breton Regional Municipality.

■ Strait of Canso Gateway Strategy

Work on the Strait of Canso Gateway Strategy continued throughout the year. This project is a collaboration between Unama'ki – Cape Breton's five First Nation communities, five municipal units, Destination Cape Breton, and Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA). The multi-year strategy will create a gateway to Unama'ki – Cape Breton that is more welcoming, attractive, and representative of the entire Island. The main components that the strategy will address are landscaping and beautification, identity and signage, and land-use recommendations for lands within the gateway region of Port Hastings.

Forward. Together.

Forward. Together. is the Economic Development and Population Growth Plan for all of Unama'ki – Cape Breton.

Building off of work from 2019/20 (pre-pandemic), Cape Breton Partnership staff and the consulting team engaged with more than 40 organizations, companies and government partners to gather their insights into the new plan and, specifically, what had changed as a result of the pandemic. The consulting team looked at a wide variety of research and data including the 2021 Census, 2022 business counts, new population forecasts and other reports to help inform the strategy.

Forward. Together. will provide the direction for future efforts to grow the regional economy by supporting local business, attracting new investment, and growing the workforce. It outlines the economic development vision and population growth needed to support that vision.

2023/24 Sneak Peek

Forward. Together. also serves as the official economic development strategy of the CB REN, and was adopted by the CB REN Board of Directors on October 25, 2023. The Strategy is available at:

Supporting CBRM Forward

The CBRM Economic Development Strategy is complete, thanks to collaboration between the CBRM REN, and the staff and council of the CBRM.

The CBRM Forward Economic Development Strategy is the first of a suite of tools and strategies including a new CBRM Municipal Planning Strategy (MPS), Land Use By-law (LUB), Subdivision By-law, and other related enabling By-laws. This project kicked off in April of 2021 and concluded when the Economic Development Strategy was adopted by CBRM Council on August 23, 2022. The full project concluded in the summer of 2023 with provincial approval and the administrative launch of the new regulations. See full details at www.CapeBretonPartnership.com/CBRMForward.

CBRM Forward is a complementary strategy to the Islandwide Economic Development Strategy, Forward. Together. These two projects launched in 2019 and will be completed in the 2023-2024 fiscal year. Both strategies support collaborative and inclusive growth as we build on the strengths of all the communities of Unama'ki - Cape Breton.

■ Strait of Canso Port Development

The CB REN continues to assist with efforts to further develop and promote the Strait of Canso as one of the best deep-water, ice-free ports on the east coast of North America. The Cape Breton Partnership, Strait Area Chamber of Commerce, Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency, and Invest Nova Scotia have been working together on this project and have formed the Strait Area Working Group.

Work is ongoing to build out the Strait region's brand which will be launched in the near future.

■ Supporting an Emerging Green Energy Sector

This year the Cape Breton Partnership welcomed a new Innovation & Economic Development Officer to support Richmond County and the Town of Port Hawkesbury as their trusted economic development partner. Through meeting with key organizations and businesses across the Strait region, this role also provides ongoing support to the Strait of Canso Offshore Wind Task Force, in addition to investment attraction and other economic development services.

Business & Breakfast Series

This past year the CBRM REN and CB REN continued to host the popular Business & Breakfast Series hosted in locations across the Island. This series regularly offers timely learning opportunities from local and regional subject matter experts and includes a meal, presentations, and networking opportunities. When necessary, the series also includes Lunch & Learn sessions.

The following sessions were hosted with the help of many valued partners during the past year and attracted over **150** attendees:

- Workplace Inclusion (August 2022 & November 2022) in Sydney and Port Hawkesbury
- Financing your Business at Every Stage of Growth (September 2022) in Inverness

- Supports for Women Entrepreneurs (March 2023) in Baddeck





■ Strait of Canso Offshore Wind Task Force

The Task Force is a volunteer-led initiative, comprised of a diverse membership, including many Investors and partners of the Cape Breton Partnership. The Task Force was formed to represent the socioeconomic interests of the Strait Area; promoting the Strait of Canso's profile and competitive advantages; and to ready the region and its stakeholders for an emerging offshore wind industry that is developed in a responsible, sustainable, and inclusive way. With the Cape Breton Partnership acting as the Secretariat for the Task Force, the Green Energy Engagement Coordinator, along with our Communications team and Innovation & Economic Development Officer, have been central to the drafting and completion of key documents like the terms of reference, funding proposals, and collateral materials for promotion.

Local leaders and members of the Task Force visited the Fundy Ocean Research Centre for Energy (FORCE) in Parrsboro to learn about how they are leveraging tidal stream technology.

■ MITACS Accelerate Intern supporting Green Energy

In June 2022, the Cape Breton Partnership secured funding for a Mathematics of Information Technology and Complex Systems (MITACS) Accelerate Internship, hiring a recent master's graduate to conduct research on the opportunities and challenges for offshore wind development in the Strait of Canso region. The goal of the research was to facilitate evidencedbased decision making and inform community engagement for green energy projects. The project evolved throughout this period to adapt to changes to local regulatory development. The project viewed the opportunities and challenges of green energy. primarily wind and green fuels, across Unama'ki -Cape Breton based on literature and learnings from other jurisdictions. The MITACS Intern has since transitioned to become the Green Energy Engagement Coordinator. The Coordinator helps to administer the Strait of Canso Offshore Wind Task Force, participates in green energy conferences and events, develops relationships with key stakeholders and partners, and helps to build capacity for ongoing participation in these emerging sectors.

The internship also created an opportunity for the Cape Breton Partnership to apply for Participant Funding from the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada to participate in the Regional Assessment for Offshore Wind Development in Nova Scotia. This funding allowed the Cape Breton Partnership to continue to be involved in the development of regulations for offshore wind to ensure that the economic, social, and environmental values of Unama'ki – Cape Breton are represented in any proposed future development.

Adventure Tourism

Adventure tourism is the fastest growing tourism sector in the world. Over the past year, the CB REN and CBRM REN have provided support to partners, Investors, and entrepreneurs to grow and develop opportunities throughout rural Unama'ki – Cape Breton in this dynamic industry, including those identified in the Mountain Bike Tourism Action Plan and Destination Cape Breton's Adventure Tourism Strategy. Our Economic Development Officers across the Island continue to support current operators, future operators, and clients in building a thriving adventure tourism sector in Unama'ki – Cape Breton.

■ 2023 International Council of Shopping Centres Conference (ICSC) in Whistler

In January of 2023, members of the CB REN and CBRM REN team from the Cape Breton Partnership attended the 2023 ICSC conference in Whistler. Team members engaged in learning opportunities through the conference to gain a greater understanding of retail and industrial trends, while working to develop key relationships with North American real estate and retail professionals.



■ Human Resources Advisory Services

This past year, the Human Resource Advisor provided employers in Unama'ki – Cape Breton with human resources guidance and advice to sustain and grow their businesses. The services offered covered the fundamental HR building blocks: policy and procedures, recruitment and retention, selection and hiring, performance management, and more.

■ Business Advisory Services

The Cape Breton Partnership's Business Planning Service enables entrepreneurs to take their ideas and turn them into professional and well-rounded documents for use in business start-up activities, business expansions, loan applications, program applications, and many other uses.

■ Supporting the Creative Economy

The Cape Breton Partnership welcomed a new Creative Economy Development Officer in 2022. Since then, they have been hard at work supporting and growing the creative sector here in Unama'ki - Cape Breton through the Cape Breton Culture Sector team, the Unama'ki – Cape Breton Creates Job Program, and supporting the creation of an Indigenous-led notfor-profit film organization called Unama'ki Motion Picture Cooperative dedicated to growing the film and television industry across rural Nova Scotia.



■ Supporting the Film and Television Industry

To continue to support the growth and development of the film and television industry in rural Nova Scotia, the Cape Breton Partnership's Creative Economy Development Officer supported the creation of the Unama'ki Motion Picture Co-operative. The support the Cape Breton Partnership provided included the development of a strategic plan, with the assistance from a student of CBU's Community Research Connections Program. The plan outlines a roadmap to highlight Nova Scotia as a desired location for both the film and television industry and identifies ways that support from educational institutions and all levels of government would help to increase the revenue of the industry for the province by one billion dollars over the next 10 years.

■ Film Industry Tour of Unama'ki – Cape Breton

In October 2022, the Cape Breton Partnership's Creative Economy Development Officer worked with Screen Nova Scotia and the Unama'ki Motion Picture Cooperative to coordinate and host a full-day tour of the Island with major motion picture and network representatives from Netflix, Warner Brothers, A&E, Lifetime Network, and Hulu. The tour served as a great opportunity to highlight the scenic filming opportunities that exist in Unama'ki – Cape Breton and opened the door for relationship building and an opportunity to grow the rural film and television landscape of rural Nova Scotia.


■ Unama'ki - Cape Breton Creates

■ Supporting the Cape Breton Island Tourism Training Network

The Cape Breton Partnership continued to support the work of the Cape Breton Island Tourism Training Network (CBITTN), by promoting the training and micro-credential opportunities being offered across the Island. The Cape Breton Partnership also joined the CBITTN, Destination Cape Breton, and the Nova Scotia Department of Labour, Skills and Immigration at a series of Tourism Workforce Solution Workshops across Unama'ki – Cape Breton.

Awards Recipients Honoured at 2022 Vital Awards

Since 2014, the Vital Unama'ki - Cape Breton Excellence Awards have celebrated young individuals, employees, and employers who have made significant contributions to their communities across the Island. Co-hosts NextGen Unama'ki - Cape Breton Leadership Society and the Cape Breton Partnership were thrilled to once again hold the 2022 Awards Ceremony in-person at the Port of Sydney. Award recipients were honoured for their talent, drive, and achievements in making Unama'ki - Cape Breton a better place to live, work, and invest in youth.

■ Indigenous Youth Entrepreneurship Program


Collaborative research between the Cape Breton Partnership and First Nations community partners in 2019 identified that Indigenous communities wanted to offer local youth the unique experiences of building, growing, and developing their own businesses with support programming offered in their own communities. In response to these findings and with support from local partners and stakeholders, the Cape Breton Partnership launched the Indigenous Youth Entrepreneurship Program in 2021.

As of March 2023, the Indigenous Youth
Entrepreneurship Program helped over **70** Indigenous
youth facing various barriers. The program activities
were delivered in person or virtually in all five
First Nations communities in Unama'ki – Cape
Breton. This past fall, the Cape Breton Partnership
launched the second phase of the Indigenous Youth
Entrepreneurship Skills Development program.
This phase two of the training program built upon
the business and entrepreneurship fundamentals of
the first program with participants who were eager to
expand their knowledge of opening or growing
a business.

■ Supporting Housing Research and Development

The Cape Breton Partnership staff have worked with both the Town of Port Hawkesbury and the Municipality of the County of Inverness to successfully launch, conduct, and analyze results from a housing survey for each region.

CB REN staff are continuing to work with both partners to create housing development packages for each of the areas to assist housing developers make informed decisions.

■ The Micro-Loan Program – empowering female entrepreneurs continues

The Cape Breton Partnership, along with partners at the Sydney Credit Union, were pleased to launch the third round of the Micro-Loan Program – empowering female entrepreneurs in December of 2022. Due to the program's success and popularity, additional partners have also joined the initiative to further add capacity and value. They include the East Coast Credit Union, Cape Breton Regional Chamber of Commerce, Strait Area Chamber of Commerce, Centre for Women in Business, and Centre for Entrepreneurship Education and Development (CEED).

In addition to coordinating the program and acting as a first point of contact for interested entrepreneurs, the Cape Breton Partnership also provides entrepreneurs with access to mentorship, programs, and additional resources that help encourage growth and success through their business venture.


Recognizing the need to sustain our francophone communities across the Island, the Cape Breton Partnership has continued its partnership with ANAPEC, the Moroccan government's international labour mobility division, to support employers in attracting bilingual French speaking talent to fill skilled labour shortages across the Island.

Immigration Advisory Services

After seeing many employers not meet the requirements of the Atlantic Immigration Program (AIP) or the Nova Scotia Nominee Program (NSNP), or that these programs didn't quite fit their needs, the Cape Breton Partnership now provides more detailed immigration services to employers. This includes advice on federal programming, temporary immigration, and selecting the best option for their business. This service is provided to employers across the Island, with a specialized service for entrepreneurs and startups.

Atlantic Immigration Program

Since the new Atlantic Immigration Program (AIP) launched as a permanent program in January 2022, the Cape Breton Partnership provided information on designation to **116** employers. Out of these 116 employers assisted, **60** employers are now designated in the AIP program. With more employers across the Island becoming designated under the new program, the Cape Breton Partnership provided information to **61** employers for AIP endorsements 2022-2023 year.

■ Cape Breton Local Immigration Partnership



In December 2022, the Cape Breton Local Immigration Partnership (CBLIP) held its third annual partner update event, Re*Connection, once again bringing together

a broad range of community partners to build awareness and identify opportunities for collaboration. The selected theme of the 2022 event - *Re•Connection* – explored the importance of social connection in newcomer settlement and how the ways we connect evolved through the pandemic.

CBLIP working groups continued in 2022-2023 to implement activities related to the five current areas of CBLIP focus: housing, awareness, community belonging, employment, and demonstrating impact.

The Cape Breton Welcome Network continued its important work of making Cape Breton Island a more welcoming and inclusive place in

its third year. The network is a constellation of local, volunteer-led Welcome Groups made up of enthusiastic people eager to share their passion for Unama'ki – Cape Breton with newcomers. 
